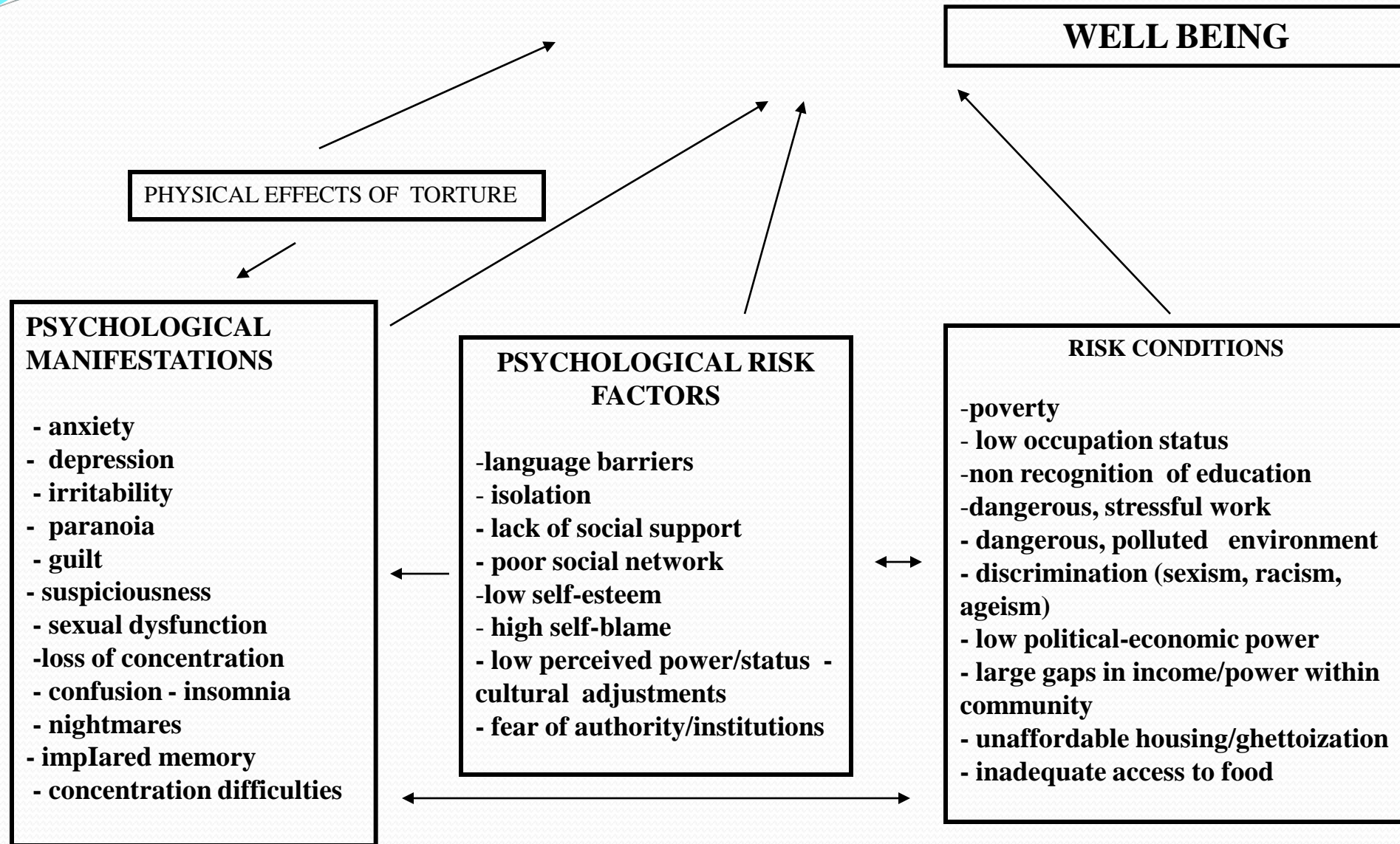

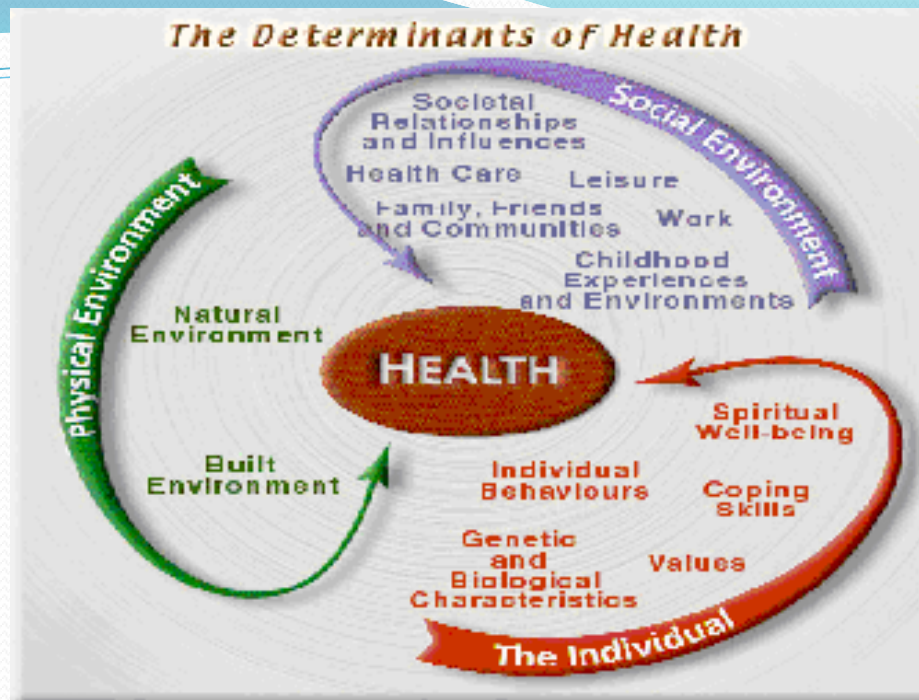
THE SOCIO-ENVIRONMENTAL APPROACH TO TORTURE REHABILITATION
